LATIN THROUGH STORIES LEVEL 3: FĀBULAE DĒ HOMINIBUS ET BĒSTIĪS

FABLES OF MEN AND ANIMALS FOR GRADES 2 AND UP

Level 3 Description: This level focuses on fables, organized around the following four broad themes/virtues: friendship and charity; fortitude and perseverance; prudence; justice and honesty. Each theme includes 3-4 fables, and students will do various activities related to each fable for 6 consecutive classes. Fables are introduced with a picture study of an illustration, a very basic "Gouin series" version and a Little Socratic Talk in Lessons 1 and 2. Students then read a simple version of the fable in a guided reading, and then read the same fable in subsequent classes in a more elaborate dialogue version, often with variations or additional characters. These can also serve for informal reader's theater or a more formal performance. We would suggest you plan an extra 2-4 class periods after each unit (theme) for the fable review activities and for reader's theater with one or more of the Theme's fables.

For all fable versions, PowerPoints are provided with images and the text, and all fables are meant for oral, interactive, guided reading (i.e. students don't need to be independent, fluent readers). Please note that fables are written with the intent to communicate the story as simply but engagingly as possible. Language is not chosen with a particular grammar focus in mind, however, the grammar builds on that acquired in Levels 1 and 2. New grammar features used extensively in Level 3 are:

- The preterit and imperfect tenses
- Present participles
- Superlatives
- Adverbs

However, other, more "advanced" elements of grammar are used occasionally with the assumption that they are understood from context, e.g. there is occasional use of the pluperfect and future tenses, relative clauses, subjunctive, etc.

Ideas for Pacing

- There are 84 fully scripted lessons, with 6 lessons per fable.
- Lessons might take around 30-40 minutes; with 2nd graders you might only do 20 minutes at a time (and rearrange lessons accordingly)
- Take an extra day or two after each Theme to complete the Theme Review activities and to give students time to practice (and perhaps perform for another class) the reader's theater version of their favorite fable of that unit.
- Depending on how often you have Latin, you might also take an extra day after each fable (so after every sixth lesson) to catch up with any work you left out, and to give students more time to practice and perfect their reader's theater of that fable, perhaps occasionally even sending them to other classes to perform the fable. You might also give them a short 5-10 minute quiz based on the items in the quiz banks.
